VS FROM WOOTTON PARISH COUNCIL The parish council met on 6th November with the most important issue being the council's budget for next year.

This was agreed with a small increase well below the level of inflation.

Overall this will enable the council to cope with the significant increases in some of our costs, especially for the verge and grass cutting. It will allow us to continue to replenish our reserves, so we are better able to deal with unexpected future expenses.

The budget also increases the amount available next year for grants to local organisations to help maintain and improve village facilities. This coincides with a change to the grant application system to reduce significantly the time between organisations applying and then receiving their grant. We hope this will be a simpler and better system. As well as agreeing the budget we discussed:

BURDITCH BANK TREES

The county council has agreed to remove the potentially dangerous branches from the four trees affected by ash die-back. Hopefully this will happen before too long.

THE DIRECTORS OF WOOTTON STORES LTD ARE DELIGHTED TO WELCOME DIDIER FELLOT AS A NEW DIRECTOR. He replaces Jack Gibbs who has been a director for many years. We are very grateful to him for his long service and particularly for his knowledge of business and banking. The board of directors now consists of Miles Tuely (chairman), Simon Linnett, Pauline Briggs and Didier Fellot.

This is a good moment to explain the structure of the company which owns the building and how it came into existence.

In 1993 the owners of the shop wished to retire and put the building on the market. There were no buyers but there was interest from people who wanted to close the business and use the building as a private house. There was immediate resistance to this idea in the village and thanks to a determined group of residents it was decided to form a consortium and buy the shop for the village. The main members of the group were Howard Dyer, Simon Linnet and Clare Stott. Without the first two, it just would not have

happened. We were also fortunate that the rector at the time, the Rev. Leonard Doolan, grasped the challenge and personally canvassed a number of people to contribute and become shareholders. Several were extremely generous. So the shop was bought but we needed a mortgage to top up the contributions. In 1997 it was decided to pay off the mortgage and a further round of fundraising ensued. This time the money raised was in the form of debenture stock which attracts interest whereas the original shareholders have never received a dividend. Initially, we employed managers to run the business and then we let the premises to tenants who lived on site. This did not work well as the directors had no control and the shop started to struggle. We therefore decided to separate the shop from the flat on the first floor. The shop is now let to The Wootton Community Shop Association and is run as a community owned business which employs a salaried Manager but is otherwise run by volunteers. It is an extremely well run organisation and we have been lucky to have had two excellent managers. The shop pays a rent to Wootton Stores Ltd based on turnover. The flat is let at an open market rent. This income has enabled us to carry out many vital repairs to the

structure of the building and make considerable improvements to both shop and flat.

Miles Tuely



In November, Jonathan Keates, former chairman of the Venice in Peril Fund - gave a peerless insight into this fascinating city, highlighting its astonishing history and remarkable buildings - all constructed on top of millions of larch-poles driven into the swamp before a solid layer of clay was reached.

In addition, he detailed the first printed books to emerge from the city, as well as the varied artists and musicians - and the labyrinthian system of electing the doge or head of state - which gave us the word "ballot", one of many words first used in Venice which spread throughout Europe Jonathan also highlighted the pressures facing this remarkable city, including the increased frequency of flooding through climate change, ever-growing levels of tourism and the constant reduction in the full-time population now under 50,000 - with properties often only used a few times a year by those living in other Italian cities or elsewhere in Europe. However, Jonathan added that some palazzos are still inhabited by families going back generations, even if they may now only occupy a single floor.

The evening, at a packed village hall, raised £874 for the Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal, taking the total to nearly £10,500 since March last year.

Our next evening on Friday December 15th with Sally Wainwright, creator of major BBC award-winning dramas like Happy Valley and Last Tango in Halifax, sold out some time ago - many thanks to those who booked seats. The Talks programme will start again in January and events are due to continue throughout 2024, raising funds for the Ukraine Appeal so please keep any eye on our website for future speakers www.woottontalks.co.uk The Talks Team wishes everybody a happy Christmas and a healthy New Year.
