#### ANTED! TRUSTEES FOR WOOTTON RELIEF IN NEED CHARITY Wootton Relief in Need is an

important village charity which provides financial help to local people who are in distress or facing hardship. The Parish Council is responsible for appointing some of the trustees of the charity and over the next couple of months we need to make two appointments. One is for a vacancy which has just arisen with the resignation of Mrs Ann Day. and the term of office of another trustee will end in the autumn. Trustees make the decisions about how the charity works and enable it to carry out its mission. The role does not involve fundraising, and doesn't need any specialist skills, or previous experience as a trustee. But you do need to be over 18. Empathy and understanding, together with local knowledge, and a concern for the welfare of others are the main

attributes which we are looking for. Previous experience working with those in need and knowledge of the benefit system would be useful. Trustees are not paid.

# P ARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The parish council met on a humid June evening threatened by thunderstorms, so we much appreciated seeing those villagers who made it to the village hall to join us.

One of the serious issues we are trying to cope with is finding a contractor willing to take on the vergeside grass cutting in the village. Our previous contractors have refused to continue. We have approached a number of firms including those working for nearby parishes but none has been willing to take on additional work. We have received one quotation for a basic single cut round the village. This would cost us £400 (plus vat??) which is three-quarters of our entire annual grass cutting grant from the county council. Despite the cost, we have decided we should accept this quotation while we continue to try to find a longer-term solution. In the meantime, we very much appreciate the efforts of a number of residents who have been keeping the verges and roadside grass under control. Any leads or suggestions for firms or sole contractors with suitable equipment to approach would be most welcome. We also spent some time discussing the 20 mph speed limit which has now legally come into force. We are keen to improve the visibility of the signage by cutting back foliage

where needed. Also, we are purchasing a supply of 20 mph signs which can be stuck onto people's wheelie bins. These will be available in the village shop when they arrive. We are however conscious that there are still remaining some serious road safety issues, not least involving speeding traffic on the B4027. With the help of Cllr Andy Graham we will be meeting the relevant county council staff to discuss what sort measures could be put in place to improve the situation.

We continue to work on the plans to plant some Coronation trees in Castle Road but the actual planting can't be until October. The details will be published well before then for consultation. The original 1953 trees were donated by a local resident, and we would like to echo this principle by inviting local sponsorship of the new trees. If you would like to sponsor a tree, please contact me or our Clerk. We were given an update on the S7 bus route situation. The county council commissioned an independent safety audit of turning the buses in the middle of Woodstock (rather than using the purpose-built turning by the A44). The audit is very critical of the current practice, and it looks as if OCC will be putting pressure on Stagecoach to revert to the old route. So read next month's report for the latest news on this.

Finally, one of the council's nominees on the Wootton Relief in Need charity, Mrs Ann Day, has decided to stand down. She has served the community in this role and, also, very importantly as the charity's treasurer, for many years. If you might be interested in taking on such a role, then elsewhere in this edition is more information on how to apply. Also, at the meeting we sadly said 'good bye' to Cris Hoad and thanked her for the huge contribution she has made to getting our finances and operations back in order. By the time you read this, our new Clerk, Cathy Fleet, will have taken over. (The Clerk's email remains unchanged: clerkwpc0@gmail.com). We have

changed the dates for our meetings which will now take place on the first Monday in the month (unless it is a bank holiday). So our next meeting will be on Monday 3 July. John Harwood

#### S TONESFIELD GARDENING CLUB We had a talk from Russell Attwood

last month, telling us about his version of No-Dig Gardening. On his allotment this entails covering any weedy patch with a layer of cardboard, which is then in turn covered with wood chips, grass cuttings, pulled weeds, leaves or compost. He will then continue to build up layers as if he were making



a compost heap. The soil stays moister underneath these layers, and crops can be planted by going through the layers to the soil underneath.

Bearing a strong resemblance to Michael Palin, Russell kept us amused, while we wondered if he was going to burst into the Lumberjack Song. Not a song about trees, but he did treat us to a song about pumpkins at the end! No talk this month, but we will be visiting the garden at Sezincote, near Moreton-in-Marsh on Thursday 13 July.

For his third appearance at the Talks, Tim Birkhead gave a fascinating and amusing talk on the varied relationship between humans and birds, as detailed in his best-selling new book, Birds & Us. Birds have been studied by engineers developing aircraft, while some peoples adorn themselves with their feathers. Others have hunted them both for sustenance. such as puffins in the Faroe Islands, and also for "fun", including pheasant-shoots in the UK when huge amounts are spent breeding birds simply to be shot. (However, some in the audience later offered the opinion that maintaining such shoots had wider benefits for wildlife).

As a link between humans and birds, Tim - a professor at Sheffield University and a Fellow of the Royal Society - highlighted drawings in caves in southern Spain created thousands of years ago where the walls are covered with red images of a wide variety of birds that would have migrated in their millions in the region, often providing a supply of food. Scientists recognize them as ancestors of those species still largely flying around the area today.

Tim also highlighted major problems facing birdlife, including climate change leading to a loss of habitats and reductions in fish stocks for food. Such issues may be confronting the colonies of guillemots on the island of Skomer, off the Pembrokeshire coast, which Tim has studied for fifty years - but such work may be in doubt after funding was suddenly cut off and other sources are being urgently sought

As a mark of our appreciation, two bottles of fine-wine were presented to Tim by Rev John Reader, the new rector, who was attending his first Wootton Talk with his wife, Christine. The evening was our 125th event and Amanda Salter created a giant rocky-road, with an inscription, which went down a storm. Nicholas Tomlinson had also baked another commemorative cake - but after he left the room to prepare the icing, his dog Zoltan had enjoyed himself eating it (to great amusement all round). About 115 attended the event and £886.31 was raised for the Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal, leading to a total of £8.044.76 since March last year. Many thanks to those who have supported the Talks - and Ukraine.

Our next evening is on Friday September 15th when the speaker is Mensun Bound, a worldrenowned marine archaeologist, known as "The Indiana Jones of the Deep". Mensun was director of exploration for two expeditions to the Weddell Sea which led to the rediscovery of the Endurance, in which Sir Ernest Shackleton and a crew of 27 men sailed for the Antarctic on the 1914–1917 Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition.

He is also renowned for directing the excavation of an Etruscan 6th Century BC shipwreck off Giglio Island, in Italy, the oldest known shipwreck of the Archaic era. Fine wares from the site consisted mainly of Corinthian, Laconian, Ionian and Etruscan fabrics representing a range of shapes. Some were painted with human figures, animals, florals and mythological motifs.

As we now move from Spring into summer, the Meadows continues to thrive. Butterflies are on the wing and Damsel flies flutter along the river banks, while overhead Swallows and Swifts wheel and swoop in search of insects.

Yet again, the Spring flora of Celandines and Cowslips has been followed by Buttercups, Birds-foot Trefoil and Wild Thyme to name but a few. Dorn Warren Bank (DWB) has once more seen a profusion of Pyramidal Orchids, many of which are now appearing in increasing numbers on other parts of the reserve. We now have four species of orchid on the site - Pyramidal, Common Spotted, Bee orchid, and the newly found Common Twayblade. The latter is an unspectacular looking specimen, but a welcome addition to the list which illustrates the success of the current management regime in encouraging a more diverse community of plants. Another recent addition to the list of plants is Yellow Rattle, a parasite on grass which has appeared on DWB. Soon, the riverside fields will be full of the fluffy flowerheads of Meadowsweet, and the air filled with their heady almond aroma. A botanical survey will be undertaken this Summer to give us a fuller picture of the plants that occur on the reserve, and will enable us to better manage the site to encourage those that are of particular importance for the rare habitats we have. While the grass is now rampant, it will probably be topped at the end of July before being grazed by sheep for three months. During this time, dog owners are reminded

that dogs must be kept on leads in

any field where sheep are present. Notices will be posted on Wootton WhatsApp and on field gates. We will soon be replacing the fencing that was removed from the Glyme Water Meadow, near the river bend, with new fencing and gates. Hand rails will also be installed on the footbridge over the small stream there.

Once the breeding seeding for birds has finished, work will start on the tree line/hedgerow between RT and DWB. This will involve a contractor hedge laying the line from Valda's Copse for about 130 metres, and us infilling gaps with young plants (whips), possibly with the help of a volunteer work party. This will initially make guite a stark change to the appearance of the hedgerow but will, over about three years, result in a much thicker and healthier hedgerow. The larger, specimen trees will be retained. We will also be managing the Willows along the river, some of which have had limbs break and fall. They will be pollarded by a contractor.

It is probable that, while sheep are grazing or contract work is being undertaken on the site, certain paths will be closed for a short period. Again, notice will be given in advance.
