OOTTON VILLAGE HALL SPRING CRAFT FAIR We were all horrified by accounts of the deadly Turkey/Syria earthquake, with reports of over 50,000 dead and 18million in urgent need of shelter, food and medicine. To help with the Disasters Emergency Committee appeal, the Village Hall Management team decided to host a Spring craft fair, to raise funds for the appeal. With Zoe Wheeler at the helm, on Sunday April 2nd the Village Hall was transformed with bunting, a tea tent and the presence of a charming converted green horsebox serving hot drinks and delicious Danish pastries. Inside was a hive of activity. Fifteen local artisans hosted stalls displaying an array of beautiful gifts including spring themed flower arrangements, jewellery, handmade clothes, original artworks, skincare and the most covetable wooden items.

Highly scented candles, soaps and aromatic oils made the Hall smell wonderful and we are grateful to the stall holders for donating items to be raffled at the end of the day. Four stallholders from the village also showcased their wares, including Rosa Wheeler and her exquisite lino-cut artwork, Paul Simmons with his hand-crafted pens, Jenny Adams showcasing her bright bold and energetic paintings (for the first time) and Zoe Wheeler's beautiful stationery with a charming illustrated book of her grandfather's poems.

By lunchtime the hall was very busy indeed, walkers, cyclists and visitors from as far as Witney and Headington enjoyed the sunshine and refreshments outside and the stallholders were doing a roaring trade. The chocolate brownie stall was particularly popular, it was impossible to resist the delicious looking array of chocolate cakes. A total of £520 profit was made from a combination of raffle tickets and door entry proceeds, all of which was donated to the Turkey-Syria appeal.

OOTTON PARISH COUNCIL The parish council met early in April because of the Easter break. There were no countywide issues on the agenda, so we were able to concentrate on some of the more local challenges. Sadly, it now seems almost certain that the school will be closing at the end of this academic year. Originally founded in the late 18th century it has been educating children from the village for over two hundred years. There is a photo from about a hundred years ago showing all the children lined up in front of the building. Clearly there were many more children in the area in those days and the school played an key role in the life

of the village. Over the last century, personal mobility and changing social structures have hugely reduced the demand for a school in the village. So now, put simply, there are just not enough children in the village to sustain a separate school. When it closes, a decision will need to be made on the future use of the site, and the parish council will want to play a role helping secure a viable future which as far as possible benefits our village.

One issue which is of immediate concern to local families with children at the school is how will they travel to and from Tackley. The council has been assured that this is something the school authority (ODST) and the county council are discussing. Funding to continue the transport for the first two years has been agreed but the position after that is not yet clear. The council has been pressing our local county councillor to ensure that a fair and satisfactory outcome is agreed. Another issue which came up at the meeting was the change in the route of the No 7 buses, which no longer come up to the Wootton turn. Instead, they turn in the middle of Woodstock. Anyone who has witnessed this manoeuvre will not be surprised to hear that it has caused a serious outcry in Woodstock. The parish council hopes that this opposition together with the concerns from Wootton will lead to a rethink on the route. Anyone who has been

disadvantaged by the change in the route should write to our local county councillor to complain. With the Coronation approaching in May, we heard from the village hall committee of the proposed celebrations and agreed some funding to help. More information will be circulated by the committee soon. The Coronation also means our next meeting has been moved to Monday 15 May. This will be the council's Annual Meeting. On the same evening will be the Annual Parish Meeting - starting at 7.00 pm. Although organised by the council, this is not a parish council meeting, but an open meeting for everyone in the village. Every resident of the parish is entitled to attend and speak or ask questions. It is also an opportunity for local organisations to come and report on their activities during the year. The council will be writing to the main village organisation asking whether they wish to take up this opportunity. If you think there is something about the village which needs to be raised, then this will be your opportunity. Finally, please note that our recently appointed parish clerk, Corina Cheeks, has sadly had to stand down for personal reasons, so Chris Hoad is back as our clerk until we

can recruit a permanent

replacement.

LOCK UP YOUR LAWNMOWER! It is often said that summer is the smell of freshly mown grass, but for those who have a garden, how about saying "no" to the mower this May to help our bees, butterflies, wildlife and us? Plantlife, a British conservation charity who work nationally and internationally to save threatened wild flowers, plants and fungi, has a campaign to encourage us not to mow from the 1st May to until the end of the month. Plantlife's #NoMowMay campaign doesn't ask you to do much. In fact, it asks you to not do anything at all...

With over 20 million gardens in the UK, even the smallest grassy patches add up to a significant proportion of our land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate by locking away carbon below ground. Just lock up your lawnmower on May 1st and let the wild flowers in your lawn bloom, providing a feast of nectar for our hungry pollinators.

BOTLEY WEST "SOLAR FARM" Over the last couple of months Outreach has carried articles from Solar Wootton Awareness Group in their bid to "STOP BOTLEY WEST." The signs proliferate around the village.

I feel that, in the interest of maintaining a balance, it is necessary to look at the alternative argument...

To borrow from an article in The Guardian...Sadiq Khan (Mayor of London) has said...

"There is no greater challenge facing our capital, our country and our world than the climate crisis. The only way we can keep the hope of limiting global heating to 1.5C is if we commit to further and faster action....

That's why we must work together wherever possible – across the political divide – to help achieve net zero by cleaning up our rivers and air, insulating our homes, unlocking a revolution in renewable power and ending our toxic reliance on polluting vehicles."

The Chairman of the UK's independent Committee on Climate Change, Lord Deben, stated that...

"...local communities cannot take the position of being in favour of things,

but somewhere else.

To ensure net zero targets are met, everyone must play their part and be on board with the necessary technologies." This came after objections from locals to ongoing wind farm applications in Wales - with some members of the public displeased at the visual impact these large facilities could have on scenery. Lord Deben does not believe communities can shirk from their responsibilities; in helping the nation reach net zero. He said: "I think every community has to say to itself, if we don't have this, what are we going to have?"

I'm concerned that this campaign risks creating a damaging divide in our community. Strident calls for support, risk intimidating anyone holding an alternative view into remaining quiet rather than risk "coming out" with their, equally valid, and sincerely held views. Certain topics are "avoided" in conversations.

There, surely, can be no doubt about the reality of Global Climate Change, we see the evidence around the world of its effects. Fields of solar panels may not be what we're used to, but man's impact on our environment can be seen everywhere - the fields themselves are not natural, the roads, buildings, nuclear power stations, reservoirs, airports etc., etc., have all been "not what we're used to", at some time - it's just that we've become inured to their presence and thereby they becomes invisible. I agree that mitigation needs to be implemented for properties

immediately adjacent to the proposed development, but we cannot delay taking action and accepting change NOW, and doing what we can with the available technologies. As individuals we must accept a responsibility for any and all efforts to help the world achieve stability.
