THE RECTORY Who carries the stories and the memories of Wootton? There is one simple answer to that: Roy Hanson. I was walking round to church thinking that I had quoted something Roy said to me the week before on the way out of the service but that he wasn't there yesterday to hear me say so. Sat on the bench chatting happily away was Roy. He tells me that this coming month for the Flower Show he will be President while I will be presenting the prizes. So many others in recent weeks have told me about their involvement in this event: where it used to be held; who used to run it: all the stalls to be found; how this was at the heart of village life and still is now that others have taken it

on. This is Wootton; its stories and adventures for all ages. Collectively we are the ones who now carry these memories into the future so that others can attend and enjoy. But what then of our churches and community buildings? The story is not guite so simple. On Friday 18th of August half a dozen of us representing our 3 churches met Peter Preston, an architect who may share with us plans for the future of these buildings. Walking us round in the rain is not a bad way to glimpse the challenges that lie ahead. Flooded gutters and downspouts; damp on internal and external walls: the need for redecoration and reroofing, and, in the case of Kiddington, a floor in a state of collapse that means this church is on the "at risk" register. If this sounds bad, believe it. His view is that in 5 to 10 years' time this church will no longer be open. No

more services; no more memories; a fine building lost to future generations because this one has not taken on the necessary tasks, both minor and major, that will keep this building open for business. Or will it? Can "the church" be revived and restored in the way that events such as the Flower Show have been and kept alive so that others can attend and enjoy? Do enough people care enough? If not, the architect is probably right. We are closer to the end of the road than we think.

This is where it feels to me we are right now: on the edge and in danger of slipping down the other side. I would like to think that in another 50 years' time Roy's successor will be sat on that bench telling the stories of how this parish and its churches reached a critical point and decided to recommit and carry on. Now is the moment to make that commitment.

It is with great sadness that we report on the death of David Lee (senior) who died peacefully at Bicester community hospital on 2nd august 2023 aged 87 years. David was the church verger for many years in Wootton and will be remembered with his wife Gill for keeping the church, churchyard, memorial and their cottage garden looking beautiful. He loved sitting on the church wall having a good conversation with anyone and everyone who had time to stop and talk. David's funeral service took After many years of service as a trustee and treasurer to the Wootton Relief in Need charity, Ann Day recently announced her resignation from the committee. To recognise the enormous contribution that Ann has made to the charity, the chairman, Simon Heighes presented her with a bouquet of flowers. All of the trustees would like to thank Ann for her many years of dedicated service and send her our very best wishes. *Kati Rankov*



Our next speaker on Friday September 15th is MENSUN BOUND, the world-renowned marine archaeologist, known as "The Indiana Jones of the Deep" and recently back from a speaking-tour across the United States. Mensun was director of exploration for two expeditions to the Weddell Sea which led to the rediscovery of the Endurance, in which Sir Ernest Shackleton and a crew of 27 men sailed for the Antarctic on the 1914 –1917 Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition.

The vessel was crushed by sea-ice and sank on 21 November 1915, forcing Shackleton and his men to make a heroic escape on foot and in small boats. Mensun said: "Without any exaggeration this is by far the finest wooden shipwreck I have ever seen. It is upright, well proud of the seabed, intact, and in a brilliant state of preservation. You can even see the ship's name -ENDURANCE- across its stern. You would have to be made of stone not to feel a bit squishy at the sight" Mensun will be talking about the rediscovery chronicled in his book,

The Ship Beneath The Ice, which has received rave reviews. The Sunday Times described it "as thrilling as any tale from the heroic age of exploration. Bound's account is a triumph"

Mensun has led many expeditions, including the excavation of an Etruscan 6th Century BC shipwreck off Giglio Island, in Italy, the oldest known shipwreck of the Archaic era. Fine wares from the site consisted mainly of Corinthian, Laconian, Ionian and Etruscan fabrics representing a range of shapes. Some were painted with human figures, animals, florals and mythological motifs. FUTURE EVENTS Fri October 13th -

While the very mixed climate this vear has meant a difficult time for our gardens, the combination of hot dry followed by wet warm and now variable weather has meant that the vegetation on the Meadows has thrived. Meadowsweet has been rampant on the Glyme Water Meadow, and Pyramidal Orchids have thrived on Dorn Warren Bank (DWB) and have now appeared on Round Top (RT) and Long Meadow. We now have four orchid species present on the site. Sue Helm, a local botanist, has started surveying the flora and we hope to have a comprehensive list of the species present by next year. The hedgerows are doing well, and

we intend to have the tall hedge

between RT and DWB laid this winter in order to improve its wildlife value. This traditional method of maintaining a hedgerow will look a bit drastic at first, but will generate a lot of new growth over the next two years. Other hedges will be left until next year before cutting. We also hope to have the willows along the Glyme pollarded in the winter in order to rejuvenate them and remove the risk of more falling limbs.

You may have noticed that there is new fencing and gates at the bottom of RT. This completes our current fencing program for the time being. Please ensure you close gates after you.

Sheep are now present on the reserve - currently on DWB - and will be moved around as part of the grazing regime that is necessary to maintain the diversity of plants that are special on the site. Please follow the instructions posted on the gates with regards to access, and keep dogs on a lead whilst in fields where sheep are present. A final note: a BIG thank you to all who have supported the Trust by attending various fund-raising events, and please visit our table at the Wootton Flower Show on September 9th.

EN NEVIS CHARITY CLIMB In 2020, Bryan Butler, a maintenance worker on the Glympton Estate, suffered a spinal injury. This injury caused Bryan intense pain and discomfort in his lower back and numbness in his legs which forced him to cut short his honeymoon (no obvious jokes please!) After a long period of discomfort, time off work, visits to specialists discussing options, including the risks of surgery which could have resulted in Bryan becoming paralysed, Bryan finally underwent surgery in May 2022 at the Oxford Spinal Surgery Unit at the Nuffield Hospital. The surgery was successful, and after a period of recovery, Bryan returned to work on light duties, slowly regaining his strength and movement. There have been a couple of minor setbacks, mainly because Bryan tried to do too much too soon

which knocked his recovery slightly, but he is now well on the mend and back at work. In July 2023 Bryan, along with three work colleagues (Barrie Jones, Richard Moss and Burty Bower with his dog Jim) set off to climb Ben Nevis to raise money for Spinal Surgery Unit. It took the guys eight hours to get up and down the highest mountain in Britain, experiencing four seasons in one day of differing weather. But they made it, raising nearly £3,000 in the process. The whole of Glympton is proud of these chaps, especially Bryan (the one with no hat in the photo) whose cheerfulness and bravery throughout a rough couple of years are an inspiration to us all. WITNEY-LONG HANBOROUGH -WOODSTOCK-OXFORD. Stagecoach has confirmed that it has made changes to the S7 timetable to improve punctuality and more accurately reflect running times although the frequency will remain unchanged. ROM OUR VERY OWN OUTREACH THEATRE "NUT" As most of my friends know, I am a bit of a Theatre obsessive -, and spend most of my spare time either booking, reading about or going to the Theatre - mainly in London and Stratford these days.

I have been debating whether or not to write a little for Outreach about some of the productions I have seen or will see and, when listening to a radio discussion the other week I was so incensed by some of the inaccuracy that thought I would write a little here. One aim (after that) is to counter the belief that it has to cost a fortune - even in London. I was so sad to hear person after person ringing in to say that it was too much money to take a family to the 'theatre'. I was particularly sad because, as children, my Mother took us to so many wonderful productions - large and small amateur and professional - good and sometimes awful but all of which were magical experiences. All of which helped develop imagination and a love for the immediacy of and variability of live performance. TIP 1.Look ahead and use internet

to advise on likely good productions for the year and then BOOK early! TIP 2. Avoid the West End theatres

if you can - except for the smaller

newer ones such as The Donmar, The Royal Court, the new @SohoPlace, the Barbican - all of which have tickets starting from about £25 TIP 3. Look at the wonderful (and easily accessible) SouthBank theatres - The Bridge, The Menier Chocolate Factory, The National Theatre, The Young and The Old Vic all cheaper and all with brilliant productions. Tip 4. Lots of great local theatres the Oxford Playhouse used to have excellent touring productions, the Cheltenham Everyman too. Tip 5. STRATFORD - for those who love Shakespeare wonderful of course - but The Swan theatre productions are usually slightly more accessible and always brilliantly performed with music and dance throughout - whatever the subject. Only 40 minutes by car. TIP 6. For FAMILIES. I KNOW that the productions like Lion King and Frozen etc are excellent and really aimed at the Children, but they are so expensive. Don't assume they are the only thing. Local theatres like CREATION make the most imaginative theatre I have ever seen and often aimed at Children particularly around Christmas time. Next Month I will summarise the
